RESOLVING CONFLICTS WITH SCHOOLS



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Below are types of conflict resolution tactics escalating in amount of time and cost.

Informal Appeal

Work directly with the school and discuss your concerns with the educational team.

Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR)

Request a confidential meeting between parents, the school, and an impartial third person, called a mediator to resolve concerns about the child.

Impartial Due Process Hearing

If parents cannot resolve their complaint during the resolution meeting, a trained hearing officer will hear evidence from parents and the school and issue a hearing decision.

Office for Civil Rights Complaint

Parents may file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education Office for Civil Rights if their child's school violated Section 504. Unlike an impartial hearing, the Office for Civil Rights addresses specific issues about the child's Section 504.

Lawsuit

If children with special health care needs experience discrimination because of their condition or disability, parents may file a lawsuit.
